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INTRODUCTION

In today's world of limited resources, every effort must be made to coordinate and collaborate. For this reason, in early 1998 key staff from six local agencies joined together to form Allegany County's Integrated County Planning (ICP) Team. Those members are:

- Margaret Cherre, Commissioner, Allegany County Department of Social Services;
- Christina Boss, Director, Allegany County Youth Bureau and STOP DWI Program;
- Dr. Gary Ogden, Director, Allegany County Health Department;
- David Sirianni, Director, Allegany County Probation Department;
- Ron Schlegel, Program Director, Allegany Rehabilitation Associates; and
- Brenda Starr, Executive Director, Allegany Council on Alcoholism and Substance Abuse.

With an end goal of integrating the plans and planning functions of the above six agencies and county departments, the ICP team explored the planning processes of each agency, areas of similarity and difference, and resources needed for change. We subsequently obtained limited funding from the New York State Office of Children and Family Services. Based on this level of financial support, the ICP team determined that an appropriate first step in coordinating our planning efforts was to eliminate the existing duplication of effort needed to gather comprehensive, accurate data needed for planning purposes. This Data Book is designed to serve that purpose.

The Data Book contains statistics on a wide range of economic, social, health, and other factors. Information selected for inclusion represents areas commonly needed for planning purposes by both ICP team members and the broader public and private service agencies of Allegany County. In most cases, statistics are presented for Allegany County, counties comparable to Allegany, and New York State as a whole. This presentation allows users of the Data Book to make comparisons regarding Allegany County's relative standing in a given area.

A cooperative effort among 13 state agencies on the New York State Council on Children and Families led to the development of the New York State Touchstones. The Touchstones establish outcome measures for children and their families, integrating policy and program planning across those 13 state agencies. The Allegany County Data Book is organized according to the Touchstones. The Data Book therefore has six primary sections – economic security, physical and emotional health, education, citizenship, family, and community. Pages *iv* through *vi* provide a complete listing of the Touchstones, including references to appropriate tables and charts where related statistics can be found. Reference information is included at the end of each section, identifying the source of all data and providing contacts should a reader desire additional information or detail.

The ICP team plans to update the Data Book annually if resources allow. Updated information will be made available to interested parties to the greatest extent possible.
